Preference will be given to individuals with prior research on the syntax of one or more Iranian languages and/or on nominal linkers. Native or near-native fluency in one or more Iranian languages is considered an asset.

The initial term of the appointment will be for one year with a possibility of renewal for another year. The salary will be CAD \$37,000 (plus benefits) per year.
